
General Land Office: Get the Most Out of the BLM-GLO Website Lisa S. Gorrell, CG

Introduction

There were two ways that land in the United States was first distributed. The Colonial governments distributed land by way of land grants. This land is described by what is termed "metes and bounds," the lengths and angles of the boundary of the property. Once the Federal Government was in charge of distributing land to settlers, the system of conveying land and its description changed to a rectangular system of "township, range, and section."

The General Land Office records on the Bureau of Land Management website have these first transactions of the federal land to private parties. This is an index of those who received a land patent, i.e., completed the whole process to obtain their patent, or title to the land. The map below shows the states that are part of the Rectangular Survey System. The states in white distributed their land. This includes all the colonial states plus Texas and Hawaii.



After a settler received their land from the Federal government, all following transactions of that land were done at the county level and the records are found in deed books.

On the home page, search records using the "Search Records" tab. Check out the "Reference Tab" to learn what federal records are, how to search the website, and for a glossary of terms.

Most of your search will be done on the Patents view.

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<u>By Location & Name</u>. On this page, you can search by location, specifically down to the county, and by name. You do not need to fill in all the fields. If the surname is not common, then search by last name only. Most of the time you will be using the location and names section only.

<u>By Land Description</u>. Sometimes though, you want to know who received the land by the land description. There you only fill in the township, range, meridian, and section number. This will bring up the people who purchased or received land through homesteading or bounty land.

<u>Using Miscellaneous</u>. Perhaps you are doing a study of an area and want to know who got land by homesteading or by some other authority. This section would be considered advanced and this presentation will not be covering it.

Searching for land patents.

The search box allows for first and last names and location. You can fill in as much as you want.



Click on the Accession number to bring up their record.

This record gives the name of the land office, the law under which the land is conveyed, the total number of acres and the document number. This information is needed if you want to order the land records from the National Archives.

Land Descriptions

The land is divided into townships and ranges. These are measured off meridian and base lines.



Using the Bureau of Land Management Website

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The township has 36 sections. These can be divided up in many ways. Typical measurement is a quarter section of 160 acres. However, these quarter sections can be further divided. Here are some samples of the way the measurement can be written in a patent or a deed.

- Northeast quarter = NE4 = NE $\frac{1}{4}$
- West half of the southeast quarter = W ¹/₂ SE ¹/₄ = W2 SE4
- Southwest quarter of southeast quarter = SW ¹/₄ SE
 ¹/₄ = SW4 SE4

Patent Image Tab

The patent is under the Patent Image tab. This can be downloaded.

Related Documents Tab

Under the related tab, all landowners are listed in the same section. Be sure to check this tab to see if any of the other owners might be kin. They are part of their FAN club.

Surveys

The surveys tab lists maps of the surveys if available. These maps can help you see what the land was like when it was first surveyed. The maps are the whole township, not just the section. You might see where the closest creek or river is.

Tract Books

If a tract book page is linked to this township, you will see those pages. Tract books are arranged by Township, Range, and Section. It shows all transactions for a particular section, whether they received the patent or not. This is the only way you might discover an ancestor tried to purchase land but gave it up.
